- <sup>1</sup> FY 1991 GPA appropriation includes a \$40.8 million deappropriation reflecting the June 1991 payment which was deferred until after July 1, 1991.
- <sup>2</sup> FY 1993 General Purpose Aid amounts include \$721,475 transferred from the Office of Substance Abuse.
- <sup>3</sup> FY 1994 and FY 1995 General Purpose Aid amounts include allocations of \$15m and \$1m respectively from funds received from the sale of a portion of Interstate 95 to the Maine Turnpike Authority. The FY 1995 General Purpose Aid amount includes \$2.3m from the Long Falls Dam settlement.
- <sup>4</sup> FY 1998 GPA appropriation includes \$39,226,419 appropriated to the Department of Administrative and Financial Services for the June 1998 subsidy payment.
- <sup>5</sup> FY 2000 GPA includes \$3,783,692 appropriated to and expended in the Hardship Cushion for General Purpose Aid account.
